Hillsboro City Council Meeting October 12, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm.

Roll call was taken and those present were Mayor Downs and Commissioners Duncan, Robbins and Wright. Commissioner Murphy was absent.

The "Pledge of Allegiance" was recited.

Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.

Commissioners' reports:

Commissioner Robbins read his reports and they will be included in the minutes.

Commissioner Murphy was absent but Deputy Chief Hopper spoke reference to catalytic convertors that have been stolen off vehicles around town.

Commissioner Duncan had nothing to report said everything was on the agenda.

Commissioner Wright read her report and it will be included in the minutes.

Mayor Downs said the Imagine Hillsboro Fall Festival went well and Atlas 46 & Hardcore Hammers sponsored the monster build. Downs showed some yard sale signs he had taken off poles around town and some of the signs was taped to painted lights and pulled the paint off when he removed them. Downs said the City needs to start fining people when they put signs up and don't take them down and it will be addressed later in the meeting.

Community Planner Jonathan Weyer gave his report and it will be included in the minutes.

City Engineer Jeremy Connor said they will assist with the grant and the public meeting for Seward St. bridge was not well attended and was going to address the planning commission on the bridge. Connor said a grant was submitted for the bridge in early October. Connor said they would have a site visit on Helston PI. soon and the sidewalk grant should be returned from IDOT soon to proceed with the projects.

There were no public comments.

Dr. David let addressed the Council on the South Central Illinois Regional Workforce Training and Innovation Center and his report will be included in the minutes.

Motion was made by Commissioner Duncan and seconded by Commissioner Robbins to accept the 2021 audit report from Patton & Company. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Duncan and seconded by Commissioner Robbins to approve paying bills for the month of October in the amount of \$494,823.69. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Robbins and seconded by Commissioner Wright to adopt Ordinance No. 1717, an ordinance amending Article V sections 27-5-2 & 27-5-15 of the City Code. Motion was made by Commissioner Wright and seconded by Commissioner Robbins to amend the motion to include Article V sections 27-5-7 & 27-5-16 of the City Code instead of 27-5-2 & 27-5-15. Amended motion carried 4-0. Motion was made by Commissioner Robbins and seconded by Commissioner Wright to adopt the ordinance as amended. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Robbins and seconded by Commissioner Wright to adopt Ordinance No. 1718, an ordinance to amend article VI – sign regulations to include a fine up to \$750 for anyone who violates section VI. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Wright and seconded by Commissioner Robbins to adopt Ordinance No. 1719, an ordinance to amend Article II – rates and regulations 38-2-1(I) of the City Code. The amendments include raising the late penalty to 15%, for a hardship the customer must present it to City Hall before termination of services, raising the disconnection and reconnection fee to \$40 each and if it is not a delinquent account the fee will be \$25 for each disconnection and reconnection. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Robbins and seconded by Commissioner Wright to approve a \$2,000 Façade Improvement Grant reimbursement to Ben & Amanda Cunningham for work done at 130 E. Seward St. in Hillsboro. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Duncan and seconded by Commissioner Wright to approve a \$2,000 Façade Improvement Grant for Teresa Taylor at 211 S. Main St., Tony Dragoo at 439 S. Main St., and Connie Childers at 101 S. Main St. in Hillsboro. Motion was made by Commissioner Duncan and seconded by Commissioner Wright to amend the motion to approve grants for Tony Dragoo and Connie Childers and table the approval for Teresa Taylor until more information could be got. Amended motion carried 4-0. Motion was made Commissioner Wright and seconded by Commissioner Duncan to approve the motion as amended. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Robbins and seconded by Commissioner Wright to approve a community bike ride on October 29th at 6p and 7p. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Wright and seconded by Commissioner Duncan to approve purchasing 12 - 1" meters and 88 - 5/8"x3/4" meters from Midwest Meters for a cost of \$25,132. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Wright and seconded by Commissioner Robbins to approve amending chapter 38 of the utility code. Proposed changes include 38-2-1(I)(2)(b) – remove section (b) completely, 38-2-1(I)(2)(C)- amend to read that the consumer has the right to be heard and has until the scheduled termination to present evidence in his behalf to City Hall if he does not agree with the bill, 38-2-1(I)(2)(d) remove section D completely, 38-2-1(I)(3-5) remove sections 3,4 & 5, 38-2-6(a) amend to read that all applicants that are no the property owner for which the service is requested, and 38-2-6(b) remove the last two sentences. Motion carried 4-0.

Motion was made by Commissioner Robbins and seconded by Commissioner Duncan to approve purchasing a new front door for City Hall from Carlinville Glass Cutters, LLC for a cost of \$2,252 including parts and installation. Motion carried 4-0.

Mayor Sullivan told the Council the City would be working on a rebuild downtown and main street grant and asked for everyone to get involved and help support the grant that will be written by the Community Planner with assistance from Hurst & Rosche.

Motion to Adjourn was made at 8:19 pm by Commissioner Robbins and seconded by Commissioner Wright. Motion carried 4-0.
